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Dear Friend | Bishop Pedro Pablo Elizondo, LC



Reflecting on my 25 years of the priesthood, I would like to express my deepest and most sincere gratitude for the many prayers and sacrifices you have made for me over the years. There might not be a better example of the fruit of your prayers and support than the fact that our seminary in the Yucatan Peninsula is filling up with solid, holy vocations from the local villages. Thanks to the tremendous work of our "Evangelizadores" or Lay Missionaries.

The Catholic Church faces the challenge of being able to attend to the needs of millions of devoted baptized Catholics. The Church also needs to reach out and evangelize the un-baptized, sharing with them the Gospel of our Lord.

In many parts of Latin America, people live their faith vibrantly, strengthening themselves to handle their daily life

difficulties - especially where poverty abounds and help does not often arrive. The Catholic Church in Latin America has also faced difficulties. One of the biggest of which is the lack of religious vocations that are needed to serve thousands of faithful. These large numbers of needy people, make it easy for other religious groups to preach different messages, confusing the people and leading them away from their Catholic faith. Sixty dioceses in different Latin American countries: Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador and Venezuela - count on the support of close to 700 evangelizers who walk hundreds of miles in their mission to share the gospel of our Lord and to help foster new priestly vocations to guide future evangelizers and for this I am eternally grateful.

Today, we have 15 minor seminarians, 68 seminarians, and 78 priests serving the thousands of needy souls in the Prelature of Cancún-Chetumal. See the article and

Furthermore, in the past six months we have sent another \$5,500,000 worth of food and medicine to the Philippines - thanks to all who contributed to this urgent appeal (see page 4). Our medical missionaries also completed a few successful missions highlighted by our first mission to the continent of Africa! (I hope you enjoy the update on the next page)

As Bishop, I consider it a great honor and privilege to have been given such an immense gift as that of the priesthood of Jesus Christ. Accompanied by your prayers, I hope to exercise the next 25 years of my priestly ministry conquering poverty with the richness of our Catholic faith.

Bibiani, Ghana | HELPING HANDS Medical Missions

At the end of April, HELPING HANDS Medical Missions (HHMM) sent its first medical missionary team into Bibiani, in the Western Region of Ghana, Africa. Fr. Simon Assamoah from St. Teresa's Catholic Church in Bibiani had invited HHMM earlier in 2007.



HHMM's goal is to provide medical care in the fullness of the Catholic faith and to attend to the spiritual needs of the people while offering the volunteers a life-transforming experience. Each HHMM team is made up of medical personnel, a priest, and numerous volunteers.

HHMM's Atlanta Chapter, led by Dr. Phil Kelley, organized the Ghana mission. In preparation for their arrival, the Chapter had successfully shipped and delivered more than 200 thousand dollars in supplies and equipment.

After a commissioning mass, the twenty-member mission team divided into seven groups to make house calls in the area. The groups encouraged the people to live their faith, prayed with them and reminded them that "the family that prays together stays together". They were also encouraged to take advantage of the availability of the sacraments being offered by the Mission Chaplain, Fr. Jeffery Jambon, LC. On Sunday, the team attended a half-day retreat and the opening ceremony of the new hospital building in Bibiani.

Throughout their week-long stay, primary care teams went out of the hospital to the nearby villages of Subiri and Sui. Over 1,500 patients received

medical treatment including medical consultations, urology surgeries, dental care and physical therapy.

HELPING HANDS Medical Missions is already preparing its return trip to Bibiani in 2009. Dr. Kelley encourages doctors and nurses who are considering going on a medical mission to "follow the Holy Spirit's inspiration to serve the poor in need of medical care."

The next missions will be:

Fast Action! | Disaster Relief Efforts

Catholic World Mission is excited to announce the start of another new and important outreach project: Emergency Food and Medicine Shipments. Along with our other core focuses – education, medical missions, and evangelization – Catholic World Mission is committed to helping meet the most basic needs of those living in the most difficult of circumstances.

In November of 2007, CWM was able to send our first supply shipment out to thousands of men, women and children in the poorest areas of the Philippines. Over 30,000 people benefited from the gift of this one shipment. These included families who live at dump sites and other impoverished areas – about 60% of those engaged in garbage picking for survival are children between the ages of 5-18.

CWM is pleased to work in conjunction with other missionary groups to promote the long-term transformation of poverty by addressing the need to alleviate immediate physical suffering. This shipment of food, medicine and supplies was sent to and distributed by the Missionaries of the Poor Sisters, who live and work with the most impoverished of the Filipino population in the areas around Camarines Sur and Manila. The Sisters run free mobile clinics, assisted by doctors and nurses, and also distribute supplies to local hospitals and Catholic parishes throughout the region.

Doctors and nurses who help the Sisters to treat the local population in these free clinics report a certain level of frustration at their inability to provide what are often-times very common medications to families that cannot afford to buy even enough food to sustain themselves.

Shipments of this kind allow these healthcare providers to not only diagnosis the problem, but to provide follow-up treatment as well.

The contents of these emergency shipments are procured by our Development Director and are provided at no cost through our CWM gift-in-kind program. We take special care to assure that all medications and supplies provided are in the fullness of the Catholic tradition. CWM must only fund the shipping costs to send these items overseas. With the help of our most generous supporters, CWM has been able to provide this life-saving shipment of food and medicine to our poorest brothers and sisters in the Philippines who need it most.

John is one of the children who benefited from the food that came in our supply shipment. So many of the poor suffer from malnutrition; after only a few months of attention, John's health began to improve. This is the real difference that CWM is able to make in the lives of the poor because of the generosity of our supporters.

Apostolate Spotlight | Full-Time Lay Missionaries

Answering the call to evangelize, Catholic World Mission's Full Time Lay Missionary program is active throughout Latin America striving to support the efforts of the limited number of missionary priests in the area. Throughout the region, large populations and vast territorial expanses make catechesis difficult. Our Evangelizadores de Tiempo Completo (ETCs) are local to the area in which they work and therefore are familiar with the customs and local dialects making their role in evangelizing increasingly important. They provide solid witnesses to the Catholic faith by their own example in a society that is becoming more and more secular.

Our ETCs work full-time for the Church under the direction of their local parish priest and bishop. They are prepared for missionary work with an intensive program of study and prayer, which continues in two week-long sessions throughout the year. The duties of the ETC include providing preparation courses for those receiving the Sacraments, promoting formation activities for children and adults, and training and managing additional part-time Catechists. Today, this project has grown to over 696 full time missionaries working in 59 dioceses.

One critical outcome of the ETC program is seen in relation to religious vocations. The program offers both young men and women the opportunity to hear the call of Christ and begin the path of vocational discernment. Since 2003, the ETC program has seen an increase in the number of vocations coming from the communities in which they serve. From 2004 through 2007, the program has helped over 470 youth move towards some seminary or institute of the consecrated life.

Every year, the ETC evangelizing effort reaches its peak during Holy Week when thousands of families and young people participate in what is called "Mega Missions". Throughout the year, preparations and training continue for this special door-to-door missionary outreach.

Mano Amiga Schools *Transformation of Individuals and Families*

Since 1961, Mano Amiga "Helping Hands" schools have been a central part of our mission to bring about sustainable change in the lives of poor students and their families. In as little as one generation, this educational system, which focuses on Christian principles, has transformed entire communities. Economic and cultural growth is promoted, along with traditional academics, through programs that meet the needs of both the students and their families.

Growth

Mano Amiga school expansion is happening throughout the world. For example, in the country of Mexico in the state of Chiapas, planning has gotten underway to add two new schools to the region. Another new Mano Amiga High School is also entering the construction phase in the city of Conkal in the Yucatan. Construction is almost at completion at the Mano Amiga elementary school in Tijuana.

Catholic World Mission is also happy to continue expansion efforts outside of Central America. Two other schools – one in the Philippines and another in Peru, near the capital city of Lima – are also in the beginning planning stages. Along with our Philippines Relief efforts (highlighted on page 4), expanding into the Philippines with our Mano Amiga educational system will continue the transformative work of Catholic World Mission in that part of the world as well.

Additionally, as we move toward the 2009 school year, special attention will be paid to Teacher training programs. Teachers in the Mano Amiga system deal with much more than just teaching academics to their students; they deal daily with many challenging situations due to the dire circumstances in which so many of these families live. Additional education and formation activities for parents will also be made available to help families as a whole, to improve their situation.

Education: *A Gift for All People*

Catholic World Mission focuses on breaking the cycle of poverty in the poorest areas of the world with our Mano Amiga "Helping Hands" catholic education centers. We offer integral education programs in 28 schools throughout 7 countries with more under construction right now. Mano Amiga has a proven track record of transforming entire communities in just a few decades time.

The story of Jorge Luis is just one of many examples of the transformative nature of our integral education process. In 1986, Jorge Luis graduated from the Mano Amiga program. Upon graduation, he continued on a professional tract, training as an accountant. More than 20 years later, Jorge Luis is now the manager of one of the most pres-

tigious banks in Mexico.

Married with two daughters, Jorge Luis still remembers the bless-
